Note From the Director

February 2019 sees the fourth iteration of CLEIMUN – the Cleveland International Model United Nations Conference. From an innovative idea which led to a pilot first conference (CLEIMUN15) of around 50 delegates, the project has blossomed and grown into the exciting, sophisticated and unique event that is the modern CLEIMUN19.

We are expecting more than 200 delegates to join us in downtown Cleveland from February 14th to 16th, 2019 – to enjoy top quality chairing, interesting and challenging topics, an anticipation of good debating and diplomatic skills and a collaborative and hybrid professional structure that makes this conference unique and an experience like no other.

For the first two days, delegates operate singly in committees, representing their respective countries debating pre-prepared draft resolutions that have gone through a process of lobbying and merging and an Approvals Panel before reaching the floor of committees for debate. This is the essence of the "THIMUN-style" or "European-model" of MUN Conferencing. And yet, within that structure, CLEIMUN allows for plenty of collaborative interaction through the use of multiple opportunities for Unmoderated Caucuses to settle issues and promote solutions in a more informal setting – the essence of the "Harvard-style" or "North American-model" of MUN Conferencing. In this way, CLEIMUN allows for a hybrid combination of conferencing styles – providing for a unique experience that enhances the chances of maximum participation for the maximum number of delegates and promotes a practical problem-solving approach that more closely mirrors what actually happens at real-time UN proceedings.

On the last day, all delegates of specific countries work together in their respective Country Delegations in an interactive General Assembly that firstly ties up and reports on the committee debates – and then handles a real-world style international crisis. This aspect of CLEIMUN has proven to be very popular and hugely successful, combining a range of activity and skill-sets both from delegates on the floor and the directing staff behind the scenes.

We are confident that participating delegates will revel in the opportunities on offer and that our team of student leaders and adult support staff will put on a conference experience of quality and variety like no other. We welcome one and all as participants – whether you live just around the corner or have travelled all the way from Chile, England or France (and some will have done), whether you are an experienced MUNer or a novice, whether you are 12 or 18!

Interview with Daniela Milan Director, CCWA

1. Tell us a little about your background and your career journey.

1. How did you first get involved in Model UN (specifically CLEIMUN)?

- J: Participate! When you first start MUN you tend to be exceptionally nervous especially at your first conference, and that's perfectly fine, but when you participate you learn all of the ins and outs of MUN from parliamentary procedure to speaking and being interrogated in front of your peers.
